

About our Work Plan




Our Work Plan explains what we will do in a year at the National Disability Research Partnership.

We will use our Work Plan from:


July 2025

Making sure the NDRP can last a long time



We want to make sure the NDRP can last a long time.

We will keep building connections to:



the disability community



 organisations that speak up for people with disability



researchers, including universities



 organisations, including government organisations.



From October 2025, we will start a program for organisations to become members of the NDRP.



For example:

- universities
- organisations that speak up for people with disability.

We will ask for money to go to disability research from:



• the Australian Government



• state and territory governments



other organisations.

Giving money to inclusive research projects



We want to give money to research projects that people with disability:

- lead or work on
- can take part in.



Between October 2025 and March 2026, we will share information about how researchers can apply for money for their projects.



Between January and March 2026, researchers can apply for money.



This money is to do research about how to keep people with disability safe.

We will also keep running workshops for:



researchers



• people with disability



 organisations that speak up for people with disability.



These workshops will support people to do:

- more research with people with disability
- better disability research.

Between July 2025 and June 2026, we will work on a research project with the Department of Health, Disability and Ageing.



This research project will be about supporting students to start working when they finish school.

More and better disability research



We want to improve disability research by supporting people to do:

- more research with people with disability
- better research.



We will create a program that supports people with disability to:

- take part in research
- learn research skills.



We will share tools and information to support more inclusive research projects for people with disability.



We will help create guidelines to make sure research projects include people with disability.

This includes all types of research projects.



We will keep supporting people to share information about research so they can learn from each other.



We will keep sharing advice to researchers about how to do inclusive research projects.



This includes supporting **co-design** in research projects.

Co-design is when people work together to plan something new.




From March 2026 we will work to make disability research easier for people who:

- work in universities
- do research in universities.



We will give money to programs that support disability research.


We will do this in 2 rounds.



One round will be between October and December 2025.



We will give money to programs that help students with disability who are doing research at university.



The other round will be between January and March 2026.



We will give money to programs for people with disability to:

- work on a research team
- learn research skills.

- meet different needs.




We will share information about the types of research projects we give money to.
